### LEEANN BEHMLANDER JOINS KIWASSEE KIWANIS

LeeAnn has been an involved volunteer in the community for a number of years, and she is looking forward to continuing that service with Kiwassee Kiwanis.

### CHIEF LEE GARCIA COMMENTS ON MIDLAND'S FIRST RESPONDERS

President Ray introduced Midland's Fire Chief Lee Garcia. Chief Garcia was a firefighter in Saginaw for over 20 years and has been Midland's Fire Chief since 2002. The Chief said that the department concentrated several years ago on identifying and executing ways to improve leadership, morale, training, and communication. More recently, they are working on six goals that were developed in strategic planning sessions. Goal #1 is to improve department efficiency. Current locations are based on a 1973 model of the city, and the geography of Midland has change significantly since then. A new station is needed, and two stations may need to be relocated. Current response times can vary between 1 and 8 minutes, with 6 minutes being the desired maximum. Goal #2 is to develop specific plans to meet different kinds of emergencies (which might vary with each location). Goal #3 is to improve individual performance with well defined training standards. Goal #4 is to improve operational performance by revising standard operational procedures. Goal #5 is to increase public safety through fire prevention programs and public education. (The Chief said that preventing fires from occurring in the first place is really the "name of the game"). Goal #6 is to improve the quality of emergency medical service. The majority of calls to the fire department are emergency medical calls rather than fires. The hospital ambulance service, of course, also responds but this is not really a duplication of effort. Both are needed and each serves a purpose. All Midland fire fighters are now qualified medical technicians. Midland currently has 45 firefighters.
