**DICK DOLINSKI AND THE LEGACY CENTER FOR STUDENT SUCCESS**

Penny Ecarius introduced Dick Dolinski who is the founder and leader of the Legacy Center for Student Success. Dick is well known by nearly all Kiwassee members, either through association at Dow or with the Midland School Board, and he has spoken to us before about the Legacy Center. (Our own Penny, of course, is a Research Fellow with the Legacy Center). The LCSS is an independent, non profit 501(c)3 research organization. Its mission is to engage in research that identifies key non-school factors that impede learning and effect student success in grades K-12. The LCSS, in collaboration with other human service agencies and organizations, then develops and implements interventions that address these barriers. Current research is in three areas: (1) 0-5 years of age, (2)K thru 5<sup>th</sup> grade, and (3), 5<sup>th</sup> thru 12<sup>th</sup> grade. The “Jump Into Kindergarten” program has measured the effect of assessing and addressing behavior development, as well as the value of specific pre-school learning activities.

Other research has measured the relationship between character assets or attributes with risk taking behaviors. This ratio is most favorable in the 6<sup>th</sup> grade, and then can move in an unfavorable direction as the influence of peers becomes stronger. Research has shown that youth that are involved organized sports and that are active in church programs tend to have fewer risk taking characteristics.
